A. International Meetings attended by MCA representatives

1. BEREC/IRG Plenary

The Chairman and representatives from the Malta Communications Authority attended the 4th and final BEREC Plenary meeting of the year which was held in London on the 10th and 11th December 2015. The Plenary saw the election of a new BEREC board and the adoption of its work programme for 2016. The new team will have Wilhelm Eschweiler (BNetzA) as its Chair, with his two assistants Angelo Cardani (AGCOM) and Henk Don (ACM), along with outgoing Chair Fatima Barros (ANACOM) and 2017 Chair-elect Sébastien Soriano (ARCEP).

BEREC had the pleasure of welcoming Commissioner Günther Oettinger, who addressed Europe's regulators on the Commission's vision for a digital single market. Indeed, the main item of the Plenary's agenda was the adoption of BEREC's opinion on the review of the regulatory Framework, an important component of the Commission's overall Digital Single Market strategy. The opinion argues for proportionate regulation that takes account that "connectivity objectives and spectrum capacity requirements for electronic communications services will vary from one member state to another." BEREC believes that top-down harmonisation runs the risk of sterilising spectrum and resulting in inefficient use of this scarce resource, hampering rather than supporting innovation.

The opinion also argues that member states should retain the discretion to define the scope of a universal service obligation that reflects the specific needs of their national market, including setting the particular technical parameters of a broadband access universal service obligation. The Commission is looking to revise the universal service directive (2002/22/EC).

In terms of protecting end users, BEREC, while recognising the importance of general consumer law, says that some sector-specific end-user regulation will remain critical. It is of the view that the telecoms framework should not be extended to all new services which use the Web network for their telecoms services ("over-the-top players" or OTTs).

Other documents were also adopted during the Plenary, including a report on the regulation of oligopolies, another on IP-based interconnection for voice services, a termination rates benchmarking report and a joint BEREC-ERGP (European Regulators group for Postal Services) opinion on cross-border parcels delivery. The next BEREC plenary meeting will take place in Rotterdam (Netherlands) on 25-26 February.

2. BeSmartOnline! – Training Meeting

The MCA attended to a training meeting supporting one of the Authority's project, BeSmartOnline!, which was held in Poland during which various topics were in discussion such as:

The Sexualisation of Childhood

Children are born and evolve into adulthood as sexual beings and there is a large body of literature that outlines the stages of sexual development and the related behaviours that characterise a child's psycho-sexual development. In recent years, with the advent of the internet and online technology, the concept of these behaviours is open to challenge. In their online behaviour children and young people demonstrate a 'knowing' on sexual matters that would have been deemed far beyond what was seen as normal for their age and stage of development fifteen years ago.

Wearable tech

This session focused on the new risks associated with internet enabled wearable technology particularly the information large conglomerates such as Google and Apple will have at their disposal on users of such emerging technology. Can these companies be trusted? To what extent do we want these companies to mine with the excuse of improving customer experience? Will this data be made available to third parties? Despite this, one cannot overlook the importance of the data such technology can provide researchers. A downloadable app, which keeps tracks and stores users in a completely anonymous way, was recently used to ease pedestrian traffic flow in London.

Hacking

Discussed the importance of hacking within the digital world. However, the delineation between ethical hacking and illegal hacking is, as the digital world becomes more complex, becoming less clear. We also discussed extensively about the use of social engineering used by so-called "hackers" to access ones personal information which is today easily accessible on social media, clouds storage services and email – especially when the same login (same service provider) is used.

Data ethics and privacy

The growing mistrust among consumers and citizens towards data companies, has created a new niche market characterised by consumer that want to control their data/digital lives. Some forward-looking companies have already begun using privacy as a competitive parameter and monetising on this need. The presentation looked into consumer trends, the consequences of not being able to control your digital life and examples of this data ethical trend among companies. The audience was also given a number of tips and alternative free services (for email, data storage, chatting etc) which are designed with user privacy in mind, tips on how one can distinguish between those services that can be trusted and those that shouldn't were also shared.

3. UNITE IT (Enabling Civil E-participation in Europe) Conference

The “Enabling Civil E-participation in Europe” conference was held on 8th December in the European Parliament in Brussels. The conference is a part of an EU-funded project “Enabling European e-Participation”, implemented in 11 countries, aimed at raising awareness about e-participation tools & engaging European citizens in the existing opportunities for e-participation.

The conference objective was to bring together policy-makers, EU officials, e-participation experts, civic activists and citizens at national and EU levels to discuss democratic participation in the digital age. It was also a unique opportunity for the European digital inclusion sector to exchange achievements and ideas with policy makers at EU and national levels.

The conference consisted of two panels:

The role of ICT in active citizenship, moderated by MEP Schöpflin (EPP, Hungary), and *Digital literacy, access and provision of e-services*, moderated by MEP Lauristin (S&D, Estonia).

Advanced Television *Sweden: ISPs Don't Have to Ban Pirate Bay*

Sweden's ISPs will not be forced to block controversial file-sharing site Pirate Bay, nor be held responsible for copyright infringements by users, a court has ruled [[read more](#)].
